



## **HOW TO OPEN A FOOD-BASED BRICK & MORTAR**

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## Questions to Consider

As this process begins, there are many factors to weigh. While you do not need to have an exact answer to every question, these questions reflect information that will be asked by landlords, loan officers, and mentors.

- **Concept:** What are you serving? What is the style of service (fast casual vs. table service)? What are your anticipated hours?
- **Space Location & Demographics:** Where are your customers already? What location or neighborhoods are you interested in pursuing?
- **Space Size:** What size space is needed for the operation? How much square footage is needed for production versus retail/seating space?
- **Infrastructure:** Looking for a built-out kitchen or empty shell? What infrastructure is required to operate (grease trap, hood, walk-in cooler/freezer, etc.)?
- **Equipment:** What equipment do you need to operate? How much space does this equipment take up? Does the equipment have specific plumbing or electrical needs?
- **Buy or Lease?** What type of contract are you pursuing? If leasing, what is the ideal lease length? What is your budget per month for a lease or a mortgage?
- **Funding:** How will costs of moving into a brick & mortar be covered (self-funded, loans, grants, etc.)?

- **Timeframe:** What timeframe are you looking to move? Do you have funding available immediately, or is this a long-term project?

- [Lakeland Tax Receipt](#): The City of Lakeland requires all business located and/or operating inside the city limits pay an annual Business Tax.
- [Polk County Tax Receipt](#): An account with the Polk County Tax Office is required for all businesses operating within Polk County.
- Business Insurance: Many Catapult Kitchen members use FLIP, which will not cover a brick & mortar location. There are many options for insurance, but FLIP recommends [CoverWallet](#) for those moving into a restaurant space.

## **Commercial Kitchen Build-Out**

## **Working with a Contractor**

Hiring a contractor for a kitchen build-out is beneficial for several reasons. A contractor has connections in the industry, knows how to navigate unexpected delays, and will ensure a high-quality build-out to avoid future repairs & renovations. Contractors will also handle obtaining building permits for projects they are hired for. It is important to gather multiple quotes. If you are applying for any grants from the Lakeland CRA, they will require at least three quotes. We've listed two contractors in the Lakeland area who have worked with launched kitchen members on their buildouts. There are many other licensed contractors located in Lakeland that could complete the work as well.
